

***Every month we will be sharing water information, that we feel residents of Goodland should know. ***

Have you ever stepped back to think about where the water you use daily comes from? Here in Goodland, we have nine wells that pump water from the Ogallala Aquifer. The Ogallala Aguifer is a shallow water table aguifer surrounded by sand, silt, clay, and gravel. As one of the world's largest aquifers, it underlies an area of approximately 174,000-square-miles in eight states and supplies 82% of the 2.3 million people who live within the boundaries of the High Plains area. The Ogallala is often referred to as a "giant underground sponge".

If you think you may be experiencing symptoms of CO poisoning leave the area right away!




Go to the emergency room.

Prevention

- Install a CO alarm near every sleeping area of the home and it's not covered by furniture or draperies.
- In the winter never use gas appliances such as ranges, ovens, or clothes dryers to heat your home.
- Don't cover the bottom of natural gas or propane ovens with aluminum foil. Doing so blocks the combustion air flow through the appliance and can produce CO.





**Carbon monoxide detectors should be replaced every 5-7 years and the batteries replaced every 6 months.
