A. Invitation for Bid – 122 W. 14th St.

At the May 20, 2024 City Commission meeting – staff had requested to cancel the bid process to demolish the structure at 122 W. 14th St. since the owner had demolished the structure and put a fence around the debris. However, the owner had not removed the materials and debris from the demolition. Consequently – the City Commission made a motion to cancel original bid process on the property at 122 W. 14th St and if debris is not removed by June 3rd Commission meeting, staff begin the bid process to remove debris at property. Some debris has been removed – however, there is plenty that remains. Building official Hildebrand will have an update for the Commission at the meeting. He will also present the bids received to complete the debris removal. If the commission decides to take action to remove the debris – the following motion is listed below.

Commission will be asked if these changes are sufficient or if additions, subtractions or changes should be completed before finalizing the budget proposal. In addition, staff will also request Commission to pass a resolution regarding the Revenue Neutral Rate and setting a hearing date.

GOODLAND CITY COMMISSION Regular Meeting

July 1, 2024 5:00 P.M.

Mayor Aaron Thompson called the meeting to order with Vice-Mayor J. J. Howard, Commissioner Jason Showalter, Commissioner Ann Myers and Commissioner Brook Redlin responding to roll call.

Also present were Dustin Bedore – Director of Electric Utilities, Jason Erhart –Chief of Police, Joshua Jordan – IT Director, Kenton Keith – Director of Streets and Facilities, Neal Thornburg – Director of Water and Wastewater, Danny Krayca – Director of Parks, Zach Hildebrand – Code Enforcement/Building Official, Jake Kling – City Attorney, Mary Volk - City Clerk and Kent Brown - City Manager.

Mayor Thompson led Pledge of Allegiance

Kent stated, I need to request additional items to agenda. We need another public hearing that was previously scheduled regarding de-annexation of Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18, then Ordinance 1778 for necessary action following hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING

- A. Unfit Structure 1526 Caldwell Mayor Thompson opened the public hearing for 1526 Caldwell at 5:02 p.m. Kent stated, this is action regarding the house as the exterior was previously addressed. Zach stated, there are electrical, plumbing and water issues along with mice. One owner is in Texas and the other in treatment. I have not had contact with other family members. Kent stated, current owner listed is deceased. Mayor Thompson closed the public hearing for Unfit Structure at 1526 Caldwell at 5:03 p.m.
- **B.** Unfit Structure 00000 W. 12th Street Mayor Thompson opened the public hearing for Unfit Structure at 00000 W. 12th Street at 5:04 p.m. Zach stated, this is an old shed that has been laid over a number of years. This sits across from playground at West School. Mayor Thompson asked, did you get any response from owners. Zach stated, the one I talked to said he was one taking care of taxes and property and tired of doing it. I received no response from mailing. Mayor Thompson closed the public hearing for 00000 W. 12th Street at 5:05 p.m.
- C. Petition for De-annexation Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18 Mayor Thompson opened the public hearing for the petition to de-annex Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18 at 5:06 p.m. Kent stated, this involves lots 17 and 18 of Goodland Energy Center. Property owner petitioned to de-annex property. We have no City services to property and have received no public comment regarding de-annexation. Mayor Thompson closed the public hearing for de-annexation of Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18 at 5:07 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Melvin Crow stated, I am President of the Goodland Gun Club. We would like to expand trap range on top section of lease. We have a trap machine donated which will allow us to open up for 4-H competitions and hold college shoots on property. It will add another 20 yards to north of existing lease. I have discussed proposal with Kent. The fallout of the new range was engineered by the college and is within fallout of the two existing ranges. This is a nice donation from a private entity to move trap program forward. The new range will be a 16 foot range. Our numbers for the program are increasing and we need to expand services to accommodate numbers. The machine will be a different design with roll back lid rather than underground style like existing machines. We are asking for approval to expand lease to north. We would like to get started so machine is available for fall program. Mayor Thompson stated, it is a good program

with a lot of activity. We will look at lease next meeting for approval. Kent stated, Melvin and I can discuss the lease before next meeting.

 ON A MOTION by Commissioner Redlin to approve Consent Agenda seconded by Commissioner Myers. MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.

PRESENTATIONS & PROCLAMATIONS

A. 2023 Audit Report – Harold Mayes from Agler & Gaadert presented the 2023 audit report. Audit is not in accordance with GAAP because of waiver; however, statements are in accordance with statutory regulations and federal regulations with federal awards. Your Airport Improvement Fund has a negative cash balance which is not a statutory violation because funded by grants. Generally with utility funds you want to have three months of cash balance to operate. Health and Sanitation Fund does not have the cash reserve. The balances in CIRF and MERF have increased because of the transfers into the funds. This year required a single audit because you received grant funding over \$750,000, next year that limit goes to \$1,000,000. The statements on these programs are properly stated. The federal government takes the attitude if a municipality waives GAAP, you cannot be considered low risk auditee. I am not proposing you go to GAAP accounting. I do not care for it for municipalities because you are required to record all infrastructure which is not something you can sell. It is not a bad thing, just letting you know you are not considered a low risk auditee to them. The audit report gives a clearer picture.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

- A. Resolution 1638: KDOT Maintenance Agreement of City Connecting Links Kent stated, KDOT District Engineer sent an updated agreement for maintenance of the City Connecting Links. The previous agreement was signed in 1981. Substantially it is the same agreement with few changes. Kenton and I discussed agreement with engineer and this is the standard agreement for municipalities. We maintain the right of ways on city connecting links for mowing, drainage and utilities. Staff recommends approval. Commissioner Showalter asked, what happens if we do not approve. Kent stated, if have agreement we get money for connecting links and are eligible for grant monies. ON A MOTION by Commissioner Redlin to approve Resolution 1638: KDOT Maintenance Agreement of City Connecting Links seconded by Commissioner Showalter. MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.
- B. Resolution 1639: Unfit Structure Notice 00000 W. 12th Street Kent stated, this is shed on West 12th Street that is laying on the ground. Resolution states owner is directed to commence repair within thirty days. However, if not resolved it might be easier for City crews to clean up. ON A MOTION by Commissioner Showalter to approve Resolution 1639: Unfit Structure Notice 00000 W. 12th Street seconded by Commissioner Myers. MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.
- C. Ordinance 1778: De-annexation Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18 Kent read ordinance presented. ON A MOTION by Vice-Mayor Howard to approve Ordinance 1778: De-annexation Goodland Energy Center Lots 17 and 18 seconded by Commissioner Showalter. MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.

FORMAL ACTIONS

- A. Acceptance of 2023 Audit Report ON A MOTION by Mayor Thompson to accept the 2023 audit report seconded by Commissioner Showalter. Commissioner Showalter thanked Harold for his work. MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.
- **B.** MOU: Sherman 4C's delayed purchase of property Kent stated, the MOU is for the donation of property to build a child care center with Sherman 4C's. This would set aside the property in the 900 block of West 10th Street for two years or until Sherman 4C's organization is able to secure funding for facility. The committee agrees with the MOU. Mayor Thompson asked, this just holds the property for their need. Jake stated, yes this only holds property for them to proceed. Details of any transaction with land will be done when they secure funding and are ready to build. **ON A MOTION by** Commissioner Showalter to approve the MOU with Sherman 4C's **seconded by** Vice-Mayor Howard. **MOTION carried on a VOTE of 5-0.**

DISCUSSION

- A. Quiet Zone: Railroad Kent stated, citizens have asked staff to check into the process for a quiet zone with the railroad due to increased activity at the crossings in town and the noise generated each time the train crosses intersections. Staff has contacted Genesee & Wyoming railroad (GWRR) regarding the process. Currently there are no quiet zones for the Kyle Railroad (which is owned by GWRR) throughout Kansas. There are requirements and safety features that have to be in place if declared a quiet zone. They are required to blow the horn at the intersections. Vice-Mayor Howard stated, I am used to it and feel it is noise from a farming community. Kent stated, in research I found in 2016 there were four quiet zones in the State. They are near Kansas City and Fort Scott. Gary Niblock, from GWRR indicated they have no objection other than the Federal Railroad Administration process is followed. Gary cautioned me that another community attempted to establish a quiet zone and gave up after four years. We have not done additional research as we need direction from Commission. Commissioner Showalter stated, in the interest of safety I am not interested in pursuing. Mayor Thompson stated, there would be other safety requirements in place if quiet zone in place. I feel it is short lived while train is passing and do not see need to pursue. Consensus of Commission is in agreement not to pursue quiet zone.
- **B.** Water Conservation Measures Kent stated, it is a hot dry year. The water treatment plant has been working continuously to meet the demand of approximately 2.5 million gallons of water a day during this dry watering season. Neal stated, in last couple day's volume has dropped a little bit. Kent stated, for about a week the plant had not shut down for a number of days. This is more like the demand in July and August. Water conservation measures outlined in city code is included in your packet along with possible water restrictions that may be requested at a future meeting. The City implemented a water watch a few years ago with a number of wells down. I encourage citizen's volunteer participation of water conservation, water smart and not waste water in heat of the day. At this point, I want public to be aware of situation.
- C. 2025 Budget: Initial presentation of Utility and all Other Funds Kent stated, objectives of budget are to have balanced budgets with secure reserves, sustainable operations, investment in staff and diversification of investments.

In the Electric Utility, revenues remain level and not a big increase from last year. Collections in 2023 decreased with it being a cooler year. The cash balances in the electric utility and reserve fund decreased until 2018, then remained relatively level. The cash balance is just over \$1,000,000 which will not pay for many improvements. On production side, funding personnel at basically same level. Insurance increased but mostly items remain level. Commodities are level

then transfers to CIRF and MERF. The summary outlines challenges for next three to five years and what staff does to control costs.

In distribution, personnel are same and again increase in insurance costs. Commodities are relatively stable; however, one year showed a large increase. With utility funds, unused budget balances roll into the fund, but you have to have reserves available when an improvement is needed. Items in this fund are big ticket items. Transfers to CIRF and MERF are same but added a pedestrian crossing light on Caldwell. Staff looks at ways to control costs and supply issues. We are in conversation to become a KMEA utility warehouse. Bucket trucks are in good shape at this time. Delivery on replacement equipment is up to two years. It is difficult to manage budgets with supply chain issues. Soon we will have to assess the benefit of additional generation units. There are numerous opportunities to expand our capacity. Commissioner Showalter asked, capital outlay budget is \$15,000 for replacement of meters, how many do we replace each year? Dustin stated, it varies, we need to have a supply on hand plus have to replace meters as they age. It is getting tougher and tougher to get meters. Kent asked, what is standard life of meter? Dustin stated, it varies with situation. Some are twelve years old and test fine then some go bad after a few years. Before price increase I was able to purchase a couple pallets of residential meters to have some on hand. Purchasing commercial and demand meters are where we struggle. Recently I was able to purchase twelve meters, only because supplier had them in stock.

Commercial and general is for office staff and billing. Professional services have increased because of software costs. Shauna recently completed Tantalus training recently which will benefit software uses. The miscellaneous page has \$500,000 transferred to General Fund to help keep property taxes down. The payback of the energy event will be complete this fall.

Overall, if operated with profit and loss, total budgeted receipts in 2025 are just below expenditures. With a hot year we will make more money. We received information on the rate study today from KMEA but have not had time to review information.

In the Water Utility, revenues remain unchanged for service and sale collections. The cash balance in the water fund has had many ups and downs. Currently sitting at about \$700,000 balance. In production, personnel costs decreased because of change in staff and Supervisor is now paid out of both sewer and water. Transfer to CIRF is for improvements.

In distribution, personnel remains same while contractual and commodities have a slight increase. Capital outlay is \$10,000 for parts, but very well could be more. We have a bond payment in the CIRF transfer for a bond that does not mature until 2036. We continue setting money aside for other improvements.

The water fund has a transfer to the General Fund to keep property taxes down. There is also a clean water fee assessed by the State. The reserve fund will have some funds expended for the local share of base grant. Overall, water rates had a slight increase in 2022, after an increase in 2015. We need to assess rates annually. KMEA is currently reviewing rates. We need to continue maintenance on aged equipment. Water tower improvements for our contract are starting this fall.

Challenges next few years are new EPA lead and copper regulations requiring more sampling. In addition they require us to replace 3% of lead water lines annually. We need to continue training staff for certifications. Keeping a steady crew has been a challenge. One laborer passed certification last week. We need to purchase water rights near city limits. Last year we made changes in our state water rights to reconfigure current wells. Our wells are aged and currently well 5 is being worked on. We have 254 fire hydrants with the oldest hydrant at 8th and Walnut. We have an estimate for a water project to address two inch water lines and dead end lines and mains that need addressed. The cost is very high. Over past years water expenditures have exceeded revenues.

In Sewer Utility, annually we have a conservative increase of twenty cents per year which does not generate much revenue. Cash balance remains low. In treatment, the supervisor is now paid half from sewer. We have had to do some costly improvements in the sewer utility. In collection, budget remains basically the same. There are CIRF and MERF transfers for improvements. Again, there is a transfer to General Fund to help with property taxes and to electric utility. Challenges are the system has been neglected over a number of years. We did a lining project last year and have other locations it will be beneficial. Sewer has not been priority for a number of years which has resulted in an increase in 2022 expenditures. As I stated, there is a minimal annual increase and I will have additional information on rates at a later date. Again, sewer receipts are below expenditures.

With all utilities do we decrease expenditures to close gap between receipts and expenditures? There have been major expenditures in the funds recently.

In Health and Sanitation, revenues increased a couple years ago with increase in contracted service, but 2025 remains status quo. Again, a transfer helps support General Fund like other utilities.

Cemetery Improvement fund revenues are from lot sales and burial permits. Expenditures are for buffalo grass, fence and building improvements. There is also a transfer to CIRF for purchase of land for the expansion of the cemetery.

The Law Enforcement Trust Fund, used to be revenue from drug forfeitures. With recent court ruling and legislation, revenues from drug seizures will go away.

VIN fund is for money collected when the police department conducts vehicle inspections. The City maintains all funds through contractual agreement with State.

Fees collected in the Municipal Court Diversion Fund have decreased. Funds are used to purchase police equipment and equipment for court.

The reserve funds, CIRF, MERF and GIRF, have money transferred from individual departments. The CIP lists all improvements and equipment transferred into the fund. We have made changes to transfers to help reduce budget deficit.

Special Highway Fund is revenue from the gasoline tax according to KSA 79-3425 to chip seal streets. In 2024 we are using money as match for Cost Share Grant with Caldwell Improvement Project. In 2025, we will return to chip seal streets as long as receive money.

Per Statute, Special Park revenues are half the liquor tax funds received. The other half is receipted to general fund. We have used this last couple years so fund balance has decreased and we authorized use of all funds in 2025.

In non-budgeted funds, we have ARPA Project fund where there are no new revenues. The funds have to be obligated by 2024 year end and spent by 2025 year end. We have obligated funds as our match on base grant project.

Our main question for the Commission is on the property tax funds. Staff has made some reductions; however, to meet same mill rate as 2024 budget there will have to be about \$70,000 in additional cuts. To meet RNR, you will need another \$33,000. Staff needs direction, do we meet RNR with inflation costs of materials and equipment. That is question for next meeting as have to let County know our intention. In preparation, it would be good to have feedback. Mayor Thompson stated, regardless whether we meet RNR or mill rate, I feel we should have hearing to cover basis. Kent stated, I am concerned about reaching RNR as the cuts so far have been painful. We are to the point we are cutting needs not wants. If commission does not think something in the budget is a good idea, we need to discuss. We will get budget information to commission in decent time before next meeting. Unless commission thinks otherwise, we plan to keep mill rate same as last year. Mayor Thompson stated, it is tough with increase in insurance costs and 3% increase for employees. I feel it is important to keep well trained staff, rather than keep training new employees. There is not a whole lot more that can be cut, you need to have money set aside for new vehicles and improvements. You also have to have money to fix equipment. We need to review our utility rates which is obvious in the budget. We are really under budgeting for things that need to be maintained. We will have to make some adjustments to the rates or property tax to give a fairly presented budget. It is important to take care of city infrastructure and employees. Commissioner Showalter stated, it is important to remember we are talking of cutting needs not wants. I am not in favor of cutting services, people have come to expect this level of service. I am not willing to cut services. Mayor Thompson asked, the \$70,000 is about 2 mills? Kent stated, a little under 2 mills. Mayor Thompson stated, we can look at that, then address utility rates to help in future. Commissioner Showalter stated, I would like to get away from taking money from reserve funds to fund general fund. Mayor Thompson stated, this last year we have pushed hard and received a lot of grant money for projects. Our share of that money is going fast and if we get new grants, we will need to grow our local share. Vice-Mayor Howard stated, they have made huge cuts but I feel we need to keep the \$70,000 in budget. With inflation costs and people want good service. You have to pay for the services. Kent stated, staff can present a couple options for the commission next meeting. We will provide a list of cuts so you are aware what has been cut.

REPORTS

A. City Manager - 1. Manager memo and the month end fund balance are in the packet. 2. Ordinance 1776: ADU's was tabled last meeting. We are working to change ordinance to include multiple definitions. It will have to go to planning commission for revision then back to City Commission. 3. The City and County Commission will hold a joint meeting at Wolak Building Monday July 8th at 6:00 p.m. 4. Kenton stated, our last pour on Cherry Street project was last

Wednesday. All joints are cut and paint is done, just waiting for it to cure. My plan is to open Wednesday. Commission thanks crews for work on project. Kenton stated, it took a lot of crews and I appreciate the help from other departments. **5.** Zach stated, I put out IFB for the removal of demolition debris at 122 W. 14th Street for July 15th meeting. Owner emailed me and said will be removed by then. **6.** The reason there is no resolution for 1526 Caldwell is because there will be extra demolition costs for property and need to ensure funds are available. Vice-Mayor Howard stated, I believe there has been a lot of drug use at the house so need to take proper precautions. **7.** Fire Chief stated there is a burn ban but there is no prohibition on fireworks at this point. Fireworks are allowed July 2nd and 3rd from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. On the 4th they are allowed to light until 11:59 p.m. Parks are not to be used for detonation, nor on sidewalks or streets. We ask you to clean-up your debris. Commissioner Showalter asked, will you post the ordinance on social media for the public. Jason stated, it is already on Police Department page.

B. City Commissioners

Vice-Mayor Howard -1. Thank you to all city employees for all the work they do. All crews work hard. Thank you.

Commissioner Showalter -1. I had opportunity to meet with a couple life guards about concerns with salaries and the issues they deal with. It is tough to keep good people without a good wage. Encourage an increase in wages for them.

Sherman County Chairman Steve Evert called the meeting to order with Sherman County Commissioner Rodney Blake and Sherman County Commissioner Harvey Swager responding to roll call.

Mayor Aaron Thompson called the meeting to order with Vice-Mayor J. J. Howard, Commissioner Jason Showalter, Commissioner Ann Myers and Commissioner Brook Redlin responding to roll call. Sherman Chairman Evert thanked the City Commission for joining the meeting.

Also present from the City were Mary Volk - City Clerk and Kent Brown - City Manager. Also present from Sherman County are Bret Mangan - County Attorney, Ashley Mannis - County Clerk, Eric Albright - County IT Director, Brian James - County Fire/EMS Director, Oura Garrett - County Assistant Fire Chief and Chris Zimmerman - County Assistant EMS Director.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION ITEMS

A. Wolak Building – Sherman Chairman Evert stated, we would like to discuss the Wolak building and equipment. Brian stated, in 2012 rural fire was growing out of their building east of County Road and Bridge and the hospital gave EMS to the County. City fire was also growing out of their building. The City and County joined in remodeling this building to house Fire and EMS. Previously the building was a grocery store that had a fire. The City purchased the building, trying to get another grocery store. Adronics used the building until 2007, then the building was vacant until 2012 when the City and County agreed to utilize the building for fire and EMS. The agreement is \$1 a year for 30 years. The City is responsible for parking lot and sidewalk and also carries insurance on building. The County insures their equipment inside the building. City and County started serious discussions in 2020 to merge fire departments. Effective January 1, 2022 they became a county department. In the building, EMS has their day room which is their kitchen and office area then three bunk rooms. On a daily basis there are a minimum of three EMS staff on duty, Chris and I. Fire department is a paid per call department. Each fire call is \$28, then \$12 an hour when call lasts longer than three hours. City still owns six pieces of equipment. Our first new engine purchased jointly is scheduled to arrive in November. We will sell old engine two from city at auction. Sherman County has eight pieces of equipment, then Kanorado and Brewster house their own equipment. Kanorado and Brewster have their own district in Sherman County; however, Goodland fire responds to every fire call because we are the bigger department. Goodland fire has twenty-nine firemen, Kanorado has five and Brewster has twelve to fifteen. Sherman Commissioner Blake asked Brian to discuss future plans fire has for facility. Brian stated, the County Commission previously decided to use this room for community events. The problem is this is the emergency operating center (EOC) for the county, with secondary EOC at police department. Emergency Management needs to keep equipment in room but are not able to keep room setup for operation with public using the room for events. County Commission recently voted that the room will no longer be used as a community room. The main purpose for the room is training and EOC. Plan is to build stadium seating like in the Murray Center with conference room. Chris stated, the building has not been touched since 2012; improvements are needed to invest in the building and keep programs moving forward. Brian stated, the floor has some issues being level because of heavy equipment Adronics had on the floor. We need to do something more permanent like carpet squares which are low maintenance. County Commission has instructed us they do not want to invest in building because we do not own property. We do not see city taking building back after agreement expires without a major expense. The interior of the building is specifically designed for a fire house. It seems we are stuck on this thirty year agreement when facility can be turned over to one

> entity. County Commissioner Blake stated, looking at reports, the City and County have spent equal amounts of tax payer money to improve building. What does City think since you own the building? Mayor Thompson stated, it is a long term lease with renewals built into the agreement. We cannot speculate if in the future it is still suitable for fire. County invested in building at beginning of lease, since then the use has grown beyond initial thoughts. You now have EMS staying in facility. Brian stated, that was plan from beginning. Mayor Thompson stated, it is all tax payer money. I am trying to find benefit for City to sign property over to the County. We do not have a reason to get out of lease, it is working great and merger was a good step. I do not see it changing in near future. County Commissioner Blake stated, picture it like you are renting house. Are you going to make improvements if you do not own the house? Ownership is a big deal. I would not have spent the money for improvements the County did if I did not own the building. County Commissioner Swager stated, fire wants to remodel and we agree to changes but city owns building. Where do we go since City owns building? Mayor Thompson stated, the lease gives county right to make changes; they just need to let city know. County Commissioner Blake stated, the lease has worked, what does rest of City Commission think? Vice-Mayor Howard stated, there are pros and cons to both sides. City has insurance on building so County does not have to insure building. I understand county does not own it. Usually on a commercial building you can remodel as needed, just have to put back when leave. It is all tax payer money. I really have no problem with it. County Chairman Evert asked, what is life expectancy on ladder truck? Brian stated, it should last a while because we maintain it, but it is a 1997 model and we have to have the truck. Engine 1 is 2007 model and same situation. Fire and EMS equipment are not cheap. Fire does not bring in money but funded by tax payers. County Chairman Evert stated, if engine goes down is city going to replace or does county have to? Mayor Thompson stated, we allocate money in budget annually to pay the county. County Commissioner Blake stated, the amount paid was agreed upon in 2020 and what has the cost of equipment done in last four year? Brian stated, the amount cannot go over 2020 budget. Mayor Thompson stated, the percent was based on 2020 budget. If you need more money you need to present it to City by first of June for budget. County Commissioner Blake asked, is this something we want to review every year to prevent a large increase? We will have odd years for purchases and then some years no equipment purchased. City is paying for general operations and county is purchasing new equipment. County Chairman Evert stated, when you purchase a truck, delivery is 785 days. We need to look at it annually because it will take a lot of money. Mike Cochran, Fire Board Member stated, our budget is in decent shape. Our new piece of equipment is scheduled to arrive November 25th. We have to look toward future. We have been trying to purchase off lease units, but so is every other department. Going forward we will probably need to look at new units. Departments are not releasing their units but hanging on to them as long as they can. We are watching budget close and Ashley reviews budgets with us quarterly. We have city and county funds separated, but we are getting close to the point funds will be in same fund. Mayor Thompson stated, I understand money city pays also goes toward equipment. As far as ownership of new equipment, need to review what agreement states. County Commissioner Blake stated, I understand consensus of city is to retain ownership of building. Mayor Thompson stated, we will discuss it, we are not going to make a decision today. It is all tax payer money. I have to look at what is best for the city. I will think about it but right now I do not see value to city giving up ownership. Agreement states county can make changes, you just pay for them. County Commissioner Blake asked, does agreement state if building returns to city that county has to return in same shape as originally leased? Commissioner Showalter asked, is there something you want added to agreement to give county a better feeling about agreement? There may come a day the department outgrows this building. County Chairman Evert stated, there has been discussion for county to purchase lots across

the street for growth and storage. Commissioner Showalter stated, in end it does not matter who owns building; purpose of building is fire and EMS. Only time it will matter is if we end up with building. Brian provided information as to how much each entity in Sherman County is being used. Kent stated, the idea w city owned apparatus is that eventually the county will own the equipment. That will take some time. Mary asked, previously it has been discussed to title all city equipment to county because of additional work required for county employees to drive city equipment, but it has never been approved. Brian stated, it would be a cleaner transaction. I know it is tax payer money but it makes it easier. Commissioner Showalter asked, would county want equipment titled to them? County Commissioner Blake stated, these are all steps to clean up merger. Commissioner Showalter stated, I appreciate the job Brian has done since he took over the two departments. It is a professional and very efficient operation. County Chairman Evert stated, I agree, everyone is cross trained and he has done a great job making sure officers respond or are on standby when needed. Mayor Thompson stated, it has been awhile since we got together, thank you. County Chairman Evert stated, we need to look at late March or early April to review budget changes.

ADJOURNMENT FOR SHERMAN COUNTY COMMISSION WAS HAD ON A MOTION County Commissioner Blake seconded by County Commissioner Swager. Motion carried by unanimous VOTE, meeting Adjourned at 6:41 p.m.

ADJOURNMENT WAS HAD ON A MOTION Commissioner Redlin seconded by Commissioner Showalter. Motion carried by unanimous VOTE, meeting Adjourned at 6:41 p.m.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, City owns a building located in the City proper at property described in Exhibit A to this Agreement, which City is willing to make available to County for the parties' joint use for storing fire equipment and for the County to house EMS equipment; and

WHEREAS, County is willing to make improvements to said building which also will allow City to house its fire equipment in said building; and

In consideration of City allowing County to use said building County agrees to make and pay for certain agreed upon alterations or improvements to said building for the housing of City and County fire equipment and in consideration thereof City agrees to make said building available to County for the term of this agreement.

SECTION TWO

A. The initial term of this agreement shall be for thirty (30) years, commencing on the $1^{\rm st}$ day of November, 2012, and ending on the $31^{\rm st}$ day of October, 2042.

B. As used in this agreement, the expression "term of this agreement" refers to the initial term and to any renewal or extension of this agreement as provided below.

SECTION THREE WARRANTIES OF TITLE AND QUIET POSSESSION

City covenants that City is seized of the demised premises in fee simple and has full right to make and enter into this agreement and that County shall have quiet and peaceable possession of the demised premises during the term of this agreement.

SECTION FOUR CITY'S RIGHT OF ENTRY

County shall permit City and the agents and employees of City to enter into and upon the demised premises at all reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting the premises, or for the purpose of making its own reasonable alterations, additions, or repairs, without any liability to County for any loss of occupation or quiet enjoyment of the premises occasioned by the entry.

SECTION FIVE ASSIGNMENT AND TRANSFER

- A. County shall not assign or transfer this agreement, or any interest in this agreement, without the prior, express, and written consent of City (which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld), and consent to assignment or transfer shall not be deemed to be consent to any subsequent assignment or transfer. Any assignment or transfer without consent shall be void and shall, at the option of City, terminate this agreement.
- B. Neither this agreement nor any interest of County under this agreement in the demised premises or any buildings or improvements on the demised premises shall be subject to involuntary assignment, transfer, or sale, or to assignment, transfer, or sale by operation of laws in any manner whatsoever. Any such attempted involuntary assignment, transfer, or sale shall be void and of no effect and shall, at the option of City, terminate this agreement.

SECTION SIX

A. All notices, demands, or other writings in this agreement provided to be given or made or sent, or which may be given or made or sent, by either party to the other, shall be deemed to have been fully given or made or sent when made in writing and deposited in the United States mail, registered and postage prepaid, and addressed as follows:

TO COUNTY:

B. The address to which any notice, demand, or other writing may be given or sent to any party as above provided may be changed by written notice given by such party provided.

SECTION SEVEN STRUCTURAL CHANGES TO BUILDING

- A. Plans and specifications. Following the certain agreed upon alterations or improvements referenced in Section One herein, the County shall, at County's sole expense, prepare plans and specifications for any further structural changes needed to be made to the premises. Any such proposed plans and specifications during the term of the agreement shall be submitted to City for City's written approval or any revisions required by City. City shall not unreasonably withhold such approval, and in the event of disapproval, City shall give to County an itemized statement of reason for disapproval within ten (10) days after the plans and specifications are submitted to City.
- B. Notwithstanding anything herein, the parties agree that the County shall have the right and option to:

extend or renew this agreement for successive thirty (30) year terms upon the expiration of the initial term of this agreement and upon the expiration of any additional thirty (30) year term exercised at County's option under this clause.

SECTION EIGHT REPAIRS AND DESTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS

- A. Maintenance of improvements. County shall, throughout the term of this agreement, at its own cost, and without any expense to City, keep and maintain the premises, including all buildings and improvements of every kind that may be a part of the premises, and all appurtenances to the premises, including sidewalks adjacent to the premises, in good, sanitary, and neat order, condition and repair, and, except as provided in this agreement (e.g., losses, repairs, or maintenance due to the negligence or misconduct of City, its agents, and/or employees), restore and rehabilitate any improvements of any kind that may be destroyed or damaged by fire, casualty, or any other case whatsoever.
- B. No obligation by City to make improvements. City shall not be obligated to make any repairs, replacements, or renewals of any kind, nature, or description whatsoever to the demised premises or any buildings or improvements on the demised premises other than as agreed to by the parties as follows: The City will be responsible for all losses, repairs, or maintenance due to the negligence or misconduct of City, its agents, and/or employees. The City of Goodland will repair and maintain the parking lot at its expense. The City agrees to make curb cuts on the North end of the building to allow County the right to install overhead doors and use them for EMS Equipment.
- C. Compliance with laws. The parties shall comply with and abide by all federal, state, county, municipal, and other governmental statutes, ordinances, laws, and regulations affecting the demised premises, the improvements on, or any activity or condition on or in the premises.
- D. Damage to and destruction of improvements. The damage, destruction, or partial destruction of any building or other improvement that is a part of the demised premises shall not release the parties from any obligation under

this agreement, except as expressly provided below. Except as otherwise provided in this agreement (e.g., losses, repairs, or maintenance due to the negligence or misconduct of City, its agents, and/or employees), in case of damage to or destruction of any such building or improvement, County shall at its own expense promptly repair and restore it to a condition as good or better than that which existed prior to the damage or destruction. Without limiting the obligations of County, it is agreed that the proceeds of any insurance covering damage or destruction shall be made available to County for repair or replacement.

SECTION NINE UTILITIES

County shall be responsible for prompt payment of 75% of all water, gas, heat, light, power, telephone service, and other public utilities of every kind furnished to the premises throughout the term of this agreement, and all other costs and expenses of every kind whatsoever of or in connection with the use, operation, and maintenance of the premises and all activities conducted on the premises, to be paid 50% by EMS/Sherman County and 25% by Sherman County Rural Fire. City shall be responsible for payment of 25% of any such utilities.

SECTION TEN INDEMNIFICATION OF CITY

City shall not be liable for any loss, injury, death, or damage to persons or property that at any time may be suffered or sustained by County or by any person whosoever that may at any time be using or occupying or visiting the demised premises or be in, on, or about the demised premises, whether the loss, injury, death, or damage shall be caused by or in any way result from or be caused by any other matter or thing, whether of the same kind as or of a different kind than the matters or things above set forth. County waives all claims against City for damages to the building and improvements that are now on or hereafter placed or built on the premises and to the property of County in, on, or about the premises, and for injuries to person or property in or about the premises, from any cause arising at any time. The two preceding sentences shall not apply to loss, injury, death, or damage arising by reason of the negligence or misconduct of City, its agents, or employees and/or any condition of the premises existing

prior to the term of this agreement, in which case the County shall be afforded the protections afforded to the City in the two preceding sentences.

SECTION ELEVEN REDELIVERY OF PREMISES

- A. County shall pay the consideration and all other sums required to be paid by County under this agreement in the amounts, at the times, and in the manner provided in this agreement, and shall keep and perform all the terms and conditions on its part to be kept and performed. At the expiration or earlier proper termination of this agreement, County shall peaceably and quietly quit and surrender to City the premises in good order and condition subject to the other provisions of this agreement, ordinary wear and tear excepted.
- B. In the event of the non-performance by County or City of any of the covenants undertaken in this agreement, this agreement may be terminated as provided elsewhere in this instrument.

SECTION TWELEVE INSURANCE

- A. Insurance coverage of premises. City shall, at all times during the term of this agreement and at City's sole expense, keep all improvements that are now or hereafter a part of the premises insured against loss or damage by fire and the extended coverage hazards for one hundred percent (100%) of the full replacement value of the improvements, with loss payable to City and County as their interests may appear. Any loss adjustment shall require the written consent of both City and County.
- B. Personal injury liability insurance. County shall maintain in effect throughout the term of this agreement personal injury liability insurance covering the premises and its appurtenances and the sidewalks fronting on them in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for injury to or death of any one person, and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for injury to or death of any number of persons in one occurrence. Such insurance shall insure both the City and the County.

- City's right to pay premiums on behalf of County. All of the policies of insurance referred to in this section shall be written in a form satisfactory to City and by insurance companies satisfactory to City. Except for the premises and improvements insurance coverage referenced in subsection A of this section, County shall pay all of the deliver policies, for insurance and certificates of policies, to City. In the event of failure of County, either to effect insurance in the names called for in this agreement or to pay the premiums for the insurance required to be maintained by the County or to deliver the policies, or certificates of the policies, to City for such insurance, City shall be entitled, but shall have no obligation, to effect such insurance and pay the premiums for the insurance, which premiums shall be repayable to City. Each insurer mentioned in this section shall agree, by endorsement on the policy or policies issued by it, or by independent instrument furnished to City, that it will give to City thirty (30) days' written notice before the policy or policies in question shall be altered or cancelled. City agrees that it will not unreasonably withhold its approval as to the form or to the insurance companies selected by County.
- D. Blanket insurance policies. In spite of anything to the contrary contained in this section, County's obligations to carry the insurance required of it in this section may be brought within the coverage of a so-called blanket policy or policies of insurance carried and maintained by County. However, the coverage afforded City through County's insurance shall not be reduced or diminished or otherwise be different from that which would have existed under a separate policy meeting all other requirements of this agreement by reason of the use of the blanket policy of insurance.
- E. Cost of insurance deemed additional consideration. The cost of insurance required to be carried by County in this section shall be deemed to be additional consideration under this agreement.

SECTION THIRTEEN REAL ESTATE TAXES

In the event that the City and County are not able to obtain tax exempt status for the building, City and County will split equally any real estate taxes as they become due

and owing from the date of the agreement and during the term of the agreement.

SECTION FOURTEEN DEFAULT

The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute a material default in breach of this agreement by County:

- 1. Vacation or abandonment of the demised premises. Vacation and abandonment includes, but is not limited to, any absence of County from the demised premises for sixty (60) business days or longer.
- 2. Failure by County or City to make any payment required under this agreement as and when due, where such failure shall continue for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice from City or County (as the case may be).
- 3. Failure by County or City to observe or perform any of the covenants, conditions, or provisions of this agreement, other than the making of any payment, where the failure shall continue for a period of thirty (30) days after notice of the failure from City or County (as the case may be) or such additional period of time as is reasonably necessary to cure the failure, provided County or City (as the case may be) diligently prosecutes the cure.

In the event of any default by County under this agreement, in addition to any other remedy, City shall also have the right, adhering to applicable legal processes, with or without terminating this agreement. County hereby agrees to pay City the reasonable cost of recovering possession of the demised premises. In the event of any default by City under this agreement, in addition to any other remedy, County shall also have the right and option to terminate this agreement.

SECTION FIFTEEN SURRENDER OF AGREEMENT

The voluntary or other surrender of this agreement by County, or a mutual cancellation of this agreement, shall not work a merger, and shall, at the option of City,

terminate all or any existing agreements and/or assignments.

SECTION SIXTEEN DISPOSITION OF IMPROVEMENTS ON TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

Subject to the terms of Section Seven herein, on proper termination of this agreement for any cause other than default by the City, City shall become the owner of any building or improvements on the demised premises. If the building extends onto other property owned by the then County under this agreement, the County shall convey to City on termination an undivided interest as tenant in common in all of the property covered by the building which bears the same proportion to the whole as the area of the demised premises bears to the total area covered by the building. City shall convey to County an undivided interest as tenant in common in the demised premises that bear the same relation to the whole of the demised premises as the area covered by the building not included in the demised premises bears to the whole area covered by the building.

SECTION SEVENTEEN WAIVER

The waiver by City or County of or the failure of City or County to take action with respect to any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, or condition, or subsequent breach of the same, or any other term, covenant, or foundation contained in this agreement.

SECTION EIGHTEEN PARTIES BOUND

The convents and conditions contained in this agreement shall, subject to the provisions as to assignment, transfer, and subletting, apply to and bind the heirs, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of all of the parties to the agreement. All of the parties shall be jointly and severally liable under this agreement.

SECTION NINETEEN TIME OF THE ESSENCE

Time is of the essence of this agreement, and of each and every covenant, term, condition, and provision of this agreement.

SECTION TWENTY SECTION CAPTIONS

The captions appearing under the section number designations of this agreement are for convenience only and are not a part of this agreement and do not in any way limit or amplify the terms and provisions of this agreement.

SECTION TWENTY-ONE GOVERNING LAW

It is agreed that this agreement shall be governed by, construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Kansas and jurisdiction and venue shall be in the District Court of Sherman County, Kansas. Notwithstanding same, the parties agree to attempt in good faith to resolve any dispute arising out of this agreement by mediation prior to resorting to litigation.

SECTION TWENTY-TWO ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This agreement shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties. Any prior understanding or representation of any kind preceding the date of this agreement shall not be binding upon either party except to the extent incorporated in this agreement.

SECTION TWENTY-THREE MODIFICATION OF AGREEMENT

Any modification of this agreement or additional obligation assumed by either party in connection with this agreement shall be binding only if evidenced in a writing signed by each party or an authorized representative of each party.

SECTION TWENTY-FOUR ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTS

The parties agree to execute whatever papers and documents may be necessary to effectuate the terms of this agreement.

On June 18, 2021, we received the above-referenced interlocal cooperation agreement (Agreement) for review pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-2904(g).

The Agreement addresses enhancement of fire protection services through the merger of the Goodland City Fire Department and the Sherman County Fire Department. The Agreement specifies its duration, the precise organization and composition of a separate administrative entity created thereby together with the powers delegated thereto, its purpose, the manner of financing the cooperative undertaking, and the permissible method of termination. The Agreement complies with the requirements of K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-2904(d)(1), (2), (3), (4) and (5).

We find that the Agreement itself is in proper form and compatible with the laws of this state. The Agreement will be effective after the parties have adopted the appropriate ordinances and resolutions and it is properly filed with the Secretary of State and Register of Deeds as noted in ¶ 19 of the Agreement.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR MERGER OF FIRE SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into between Sherman County, Kansas ("County") and the City of Goodland, Kansas ("City") effective July 1, 2021.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Agreement Act (K.S.A. 12-2901 *et seq.*) authorizes any two or more political subdivisions to enter into an agreement with one another for the mutual benefit of the parties, including for the provision of fire protection services; and

WHEREAS, the County and the City have determined that it is in the best interests of the public and general welfare of the citizens of the County and the City to merge the fire protection services for all of Sherman County, Kansas; and

WHEREAS, the County and the City have determined that an Interlocal Agreement merging fire protection services allows the County and City to cooperate with each other to provide high quality services to all of Sherman County, provide effeciencies and cost savings by minimizing duplication of employees and resources, and provide for consistency in training and operations in the most efficient manner possible.

AGREEMENT

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. **RECITALS.** The recitals set out above are hereby incorporated by this reference.
- 2. **PURPOSE.** The purpose for which the parties have entered into this agreement is to provide for the orderly unification and operation of a single county-wide fire protection services agency, merging the fire protection services of the Goodland City Fire Department with the services of the Sherman County Fire Department.
- **3. DEFINITIONS.** For the purpose of this Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:
 - A. "Board of County Commissioners" shall mean the Board of County Commissioners of Sherman County, Kansas.
 - B. "Board of Trustees" shall mean the Board of Trustees of Fire District No. 1.
 - C. "City Commission" shall mean the City Commission of the City of Goodland, Kansas.
 - D. "Sherman County Fire Department" shall mean the combined operating fire departments of Sherman County, Kansas and the City of Goodland, Kansas.

- E. "Fire District No. 1" shall mean all land within Sherman County, Kansas, divided into three (3) sub-districts. The three (3) sub-districts shall be the geographical locations identified as 1) Brewster, Kansas; 2) Goodland, Kansas; and 3) Kanorado, Kansas.
- F. "Fire Chiefs" shall mean the department head for each sub-district within Fire District No. 1.
- G. "Director" shall mean the employee of Sherman County, Kansas, selected by the Board of County Commissioners as the department head for all of Fire District No. 1. All Fire Chiefs shall answer and report to the Director.
- 4. UNIFICATION OR MERGER OF THE FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES. Neither the City nor the County shall operate a separate fire protection services agency, and each shall fully participate in the operation of the fire protection services agency established by this Agreement, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein.
- 5. FIRE DISTRICT NO. 1. Fire District No. 1, of Sherman County, Kansas, shall encompass all land within Sherman County, Kansas, including that area within the confines of the city limits of the City of Goodland, Kansas, plus any area of Thomas County as set forth by separate written agreement between the governing bodies of Sherman County and Thomas County. Fire District No. 1 shall be divided into three (3) geographical portions, which shall be as equal as possible. Each geographical portion shall be known as a subdistrict and shall have its own fire chief, fire crew, fire engine and necessary fire protection and fire fighting equipment. The first such sub-district shall be located at Brewster, Kansas; the second sub-district shall be located at Goodland, Kansas; and the third sub-district shall be located at Kanorado, Kansas.
- 6. **DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBILITIES.** There shall be established the Sherman County Fire Department, established within Sherman County. The Fire Department shall provide fire protection for the citizens of Sherman County. The Fire Department shall maintain all records required by federal, state and local law. The Fire Department shall be operated in accordance with the policies and procedures developed by the Board of Trustees, and as approved by the Board of County Commissioners, in accordance with the powers and authority delegated to the Board of Trustees by the Board of County Commissioners via Resolution No. 18-15.
- 7. GOVERNING BOARD. The Board of Trustees shall be the governing board for the Sherman County Fire Department in accordance with the powers and authority delegated to the Board of Trustees of Fire District No. 1 by the Board of County Commissioners via Resolution No. 18-15. The Board of Trustees shall be appointed by the Board of County Commissioners and shall be composed of three (3) members from the City of Goodland subdistrict, one (1) member from the Kanorado subdistrict, one (1) member from the Brewster subdistrict, and the Director of the Sherman County Fire Department. The terms of all members of the Board of Trustees shall be three (3) year staggered terms. The Board of Trustees shall select from its membership a chairperson and vice chairperson ay its first meeting after this

Interlocal Agreement takes effect, and at the first meeting of each calendar year thereafter.

- 8. MEETINGS. The Board of Trustees of Fire District No. 1 shall meet at least monthly. Notice of all regular monthly meetings shall be given to the members of the Board of Trustees, as well as any other person so requesting notice under the Kansas Open Meetings Act, at least seven (7) days in advance of each meeting. A special meeting may be called from time to time upon forty-eight (48) hours notice by the chairperson or any three (3) members of the Board of Trustees. All meetings shall be conducted in compliance with and adhere to the Kansas Open Meetings Act.
- 9. BOARD RESPONSIBILITIES. The Board of Trustees shall, by a majority vote, appoint Fire Chiefs for each subdistrict each December, and said appointments shall be approved by the Board of County Commissioners. A Fire Chief shall serve for a term of one (1) year or at the discretion of that Board of County Commissioners. The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for the day-to- day operation of the Fire District No. 1 and shall employ all reasonable means to ensure competent fire protection to the entire district.
- 10. DIRECTOR. The Director shall be an employee of Sherman County, and shall report directly to the Board of County Commissioners as a department head. The Director shall exercise the day-to-day supervision over all employees within the Fire Department based upon the personnel policies and procedures of Sherman County, as well as any additional policies and procedures developed by the Board of Trustees, as approved by the Board of County Commissioners, and applicable only to the Fire Department. The Director shall be responsible for the hiring, firing, discipline, and termination of all County employees working within the Fire Department. The Director shall develop, review and maintain written operating procedures and guidelines for the Fire Department, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees and Board of County Commissioners.
- 11. FIRE CHIEFS. The Fire Chiefs shall meet with the Board of Trustees for the first thirty minutes (30) of each monthly meeting. Fire Chiefs shall send to the Board of Trustees a complete report of each fire including the date, location, and names of the firemen who made the run. Further, the report shall reflect when the run was made and when they returned to base. These reported runs shall be the only basis of payment for any fireman, except that each fireman will be compensated for one educational meeting per month. Any money spent other than day to day expenses shall be upon the approval of a majority of the Board of Trustees, in accordance with any purchasing policies established by the Board of County Commissioners.
- Department shall be developed by the Board of Trustees and submitted to both the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission on or before the first day of June each year for the next fiscal year. The final budget shall be subject to approval by the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission in accordance with state budget laws. Once approved by the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission, such approved budget shall be incorporated as part of Sherman County's final budget and adopted and published by the Board of County Commissioners as part of Sherman County's annual budget in the normal course of

the annual budget process with the City Commission contributing their percentage share of the approved budget to be paid to the County. The Fire Department budget as approved and adopted shall be funded at 51.8% by Sherman County and at 48.2% by the City of Goodland, which is based on each municipality's budget for fire protection for the 2020 year. Each municipality agrees to contribute the funds necessary to support the maintenance and operation of the Sherman County Fire Department in accordance with this annual budget formula.

13. PROPERTY OWNERSHIP AND ACQUISITION.

- A. Real Property. All real property currently owned by Sherman County and by the City of Goodland and used by their respective fire departments shall be available for exclusive use and control by the Sherman County Fire Department. Each municipality shall remain the owner of any such real property. It is not anticipated that any additional real property will need to be acquired.
- B. Personal Property. Each municipality shall prepare and exchange with one another upon execution of this Agreement, an inventory of all personal property used by it for fire protection services, which shall contain a current fair market value and useful life therefor. Said inventories shall be attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated into this Agreement. The Sherman County Fire Department shall have exclusive use and control of all such personal property. The acquisition of new or replacement personal property shall be funded by each municipality in the same proportion that the annual budget is funded.
- C. Major Capital Expenditures. If the Board of Trustees determines that major capital expenditures for the improvement of real property or the acquisition of real or personal property are necessary for the proper operation of the Sherman County Fire Department, and that such should be funded through a bond issue, the Board shall adopt a report and recommendation and submit it to the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission. If either the Board of County Commissioners or the City Commission fail to adopt the recommendation, the proposal shall be rejected. If both the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission adopt the recommendation, each municipality shall adopt appropriate legislative enactments to submit the appropriate ballot propositions to the electors.
- 14. EMPLOYEES. All employees within the Fire Department shall be employees of Sherman County, Kansas and shall be subject to all County employee policies and procedures unless otherwise provided herein. Further, all employees shall be entitled to the same benefits, holidays, vacation, sick time and other leave and benefits as is allowed by the County employee policies based upon job classifications.

- 15. **DURATION AND TERMINATION.** This Agreement shall continue until such time as it is modified or partially or completely terminated by mutual agreement of the parties. This Agreement may be terminated by either party, effective as of December 31 of any year, by providing the other party no later than February 1 of the termination year, written notice of its intent to terminate the Agreement.
- 16. RETURN OF PROPERTY UPON TERMINATION. All separate real property and separate personal property shall be returned to the respective municipality. The fair market value of all joint real and personal property shall be determined by the Board of Trustees. Each municipality shall receive or pay, as applicable, in cash or property, its percentage of the fair market value of the joint real property and the joint personal property in the same proportion that said municipality funds the annual budget of the Fire Department.
- 17. REVIEW AND AMENDMENT OR MODIFICATION. This Agreement may be reviewed at the request of either party and may be amended only by the mutual consent and agreement of all parties, expressed in writing, dated and signed.
- 18. PRIOR AGREEMENTS. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter contained herein and supersedes all prior amendments, negotiations, and discussions concerning any matter or subject contained herein.
- 19. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Agreement shall take effect upon its approval by the County and the City, the Kansas Attorney General, and recording of the Agreement with the Sherman County Register of Deeds office and in office of the Kansas Secretary of State.
- 20. SURVIVAL OF REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES. All representations, warranties, covenants and agreements contained herein shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- 21. BINDING EFFECT. This Agreement shall be binding upon and extend to the benefit of the County and the City, their respective successors and assigns.
- **22. VENUE.** Should any dispute result in litigation concerning the validity or interpretation of this Agreement, venue for such action shall be in the District Court of Sherman County, Kansas.
- 23. APPLICABLE LAW. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Kansas.
- 24. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Agreement shall be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason whatsoever, such decision shall not affect the remaining provisions of this agreement, which shall remain in force and effect; and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are hereby declared to be severable and shall be presumed to have been agreed upon

knowing that the various provisions of this Agreement are severable.

- 25. APPROVAL AND AUTHORIZATION. The County and the City each warrants and represents by its execution of this Agreement that said Agreement has been properly approved by the governing body and its legal counsel, that the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement by such governing body has been authorized by resolution duly adopted by the governing body, and that this Agreement constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligation of the governing body and enforceable with its terms.
- **26. INSURANCE.** Each party is to maintain insurance to protect its interest as it desires.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Board of County Commissioners of Sherman County, Kansas and City Commission of the City of Goodland, Kansas have caused this agreement to be executed and made effective as set forth herein.

I. REQUEST OR ISSUE:

This resolution states the Commission's intent to levy a property tax exceeding the revenue neutral rate (RNR). RNR for the City is 49.374, as provided by the County Clerk, and the 2025 budget proposed to the Commission is a proposed mill levy of 50.923. The City Clerk is required to provide notice (attached) to the Sherman County Clerk on or before July 20th of the City's intent to exceed the RNR and proposed mill levy rate.

II. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The City's 2025 budget proposed mill levy is 50.923, slightly higher than the rate approved by the commission for the 2024 budget year which was 50.154 mills. The estimated value of a mill for 2025 is \$42,471.99, based on the estimated assessed valuation from the County Clerk of 42,471,990. Maintaining a fairly stable levy generates an additional estimated \$82,190 for the City in 2025. The Commission reviewed the budget presented by staff the last two regular meetings. The Commission is aware all items the City purchases have increased in cost over the year with the economic situation. We continue to be concerned with increased prices and delivery of supplies, but make every effort to make smart decisions for the City.

Once the County Clerk is notified of the intent of the Commission, the County Clerk will mail citizens a copy of the information pertaining to our mill rate and the date of our hearing for public comment. Information on the notice mailed will be the intent of all taxing entities in Sherman County. At the RNR hearing for the City, tax payer's will be allowed the right to voice their concerns regarding exceeding the RNR. Then at the budget hearing the Commission will be required to approve a budget for 2025 at or below the proposed published rate of 50.923 mills.

II. SUMMARY AND ALTERNATIVES:

Commission may take one of the following actions:

1. Approve to publish budget proposed at 50.923 mills, which will require two separate hearings. The first being a hearing on the RNR and the second is the budget hearing on said date.

- 2. Determine if the Commission wants to make changes to proposed budget, keeping in mind, notice of exceeding RNR is required to be provided to County Clerk on or before July 20th.
- 3. Make changes to proposed budget to meet RNR. Please note the information is based on estimated valuations so if the final valuation exceeds estimated, the City is subject to paying back tax money to the public. An alternative is to try to meet the RNR but still publishing to exceed the RNR to prevent any additional penalties to the City for exceeding the RNR without publishing a budget that does so.

Section 3. The Governing Body of the City of Goodland directs the City Clerk to provide this resolution to the Sherman County Clerk as notice of the City's proposed intent to exceed the Revenue Neutral Rate.

This resolution shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its adoption and shall remain in effect until future action is taken by the Governing Body.

I. REQUEST OR ISSUE:

The Enforcing Officer of the City of Goodland, Kansas presented information about 520 West 12th Street a/k/a Grant Historic Residences. After receiving multiple complaints about the roof leaking and standing water in one of the common rooms from both residents and local Law Enforcement an Inspection was completed.

II. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

I was informed by tenants and the Police Department that there was a room with standing water on the floor and the possibility of mold growth due to the dampness in the room. Upon inspecting the building there was a common room where water was leaking into the room from the ceiling. This was causing the ceiling to fall, and left standing water in buckets that were sitting on a tarp that had a pool of water. The tarp also had water stains as if a larger amount of water had been on it. This leads me to believe the leak has been occurring for a while creating the possibility of mold to grow. The room was not secured shut and was accessible. All that was present was a closed sign.

It seems the property manager is aware due to the closed sign and water catch system they have in the room. All of the furniture is moved to the sides of the room to prevent it from getting wet. I sent out official notice to the property owner stating the issue needs to be abated. If the owner fails to abate the issue I will ask for the City Commissioners to set a public hearing.

III. FISCAL IMPACTS:

At this point there will be no fiscal impacts unless the violation is not abated.

IV. <u>SUMMARY AND ALTERNATIVES:</u>

Commission may take one of the following actions:

- Approve the proposal as requested.
 Reject the proposal and move to deny the request.
 Direct staff to pursue an alternative approach.

- On June 2, 2024 the officers on duty were notified of a possible kid sex crime.
 The officers made contact with a Deputy from Norton County Sheriff Office, the
 deputy shared the known information. The officers interviewed the suspect and
 found that the incident did not happen in Sherman County.
- On June 4th, the officer on duty received a call from an individual wanting to report missing property. The officers spoke to multiple individuals about the incident. An officer from the Junction City PD contacted the officer and reported that he had conducted a traffic stop on the stolen pickup and motorcycle. Recommended charges were filed for theft of property and criminal trespass.
- On June 6th the officer on duty was dispatched to 400 Main Ave for a possible DUI. The officer made contact with the driver and found that it was a medical emergency. The driver was taken to Goodland Regional Medical Center to be evaluated.
- On June 5th, the officer on duty was dispatched to a possible domestic. The officer arrived on scene and spoke with the individuals. One individual was arrested and recommended charges were filed for Domestic Battery.
- On June 8th the officer on duty was on patrol when they observed a vehicle pulling out of Walmart without lights on. The officer conducted a traffic stop and found indicators that the individual was intoxicated. SFST's and breath test were done and the individual was arrested. Recommended charges were filed for Driving under the influence, transporting and open container, driving without lights, and operate a motor vehicle without a valid license.
- On June 11th, the officer on duty was dispatched to a report of a person who took some pills to kill herself. The officer arrived on scene and found a female screaming. The female was taken into custody and recommended charges were filed for disorderly conduct.
- On June 15th the officer on duty was patrolling when she was dispatched to an injury accident. When she arrived on scene the officer found an unconscious driver in one of the vehicles. EMS was notified. The officers continued the investigation and found that the driver had ingested multiple narcotic prescription meds. The driver was later arrested and recommended charges were filed for driving under the influence, driving while license cancelled or suspended, reckless driving, vehicle liability insurance, driving on the right side of the roadway, and failure to wear seatbelt.
- On June 16th, the officer on duty was called to a possible suicide. The officers arrived on scene and found an individual who had shot himself in the head.
- On June 17th the officer on duty was dispatched to a possible domestic. The
 officer spoke with all involved parties and the suspect was taken into custody.
 Recommended charges were filed for battery, criminal trespass, and disorderly
 conduct.
- On June 18th the officer on duty was dispatched to 12th street for an individual who was trying to get her mother to the hospital for a mental health screening. The officer spoke to the RP and mother. The mother was placed under arrest and recommended charges were filed for domestic battery.
- On June 19th the officer on duty was called to a report of a battery that had occurred. The victim was taken to the hospital and officers spoke with him there.

- The officer investigated and one individual was taken into custody. Recommended charges were filed for domestic battery.
- On June 21st the officer on duty was dispatched to a report of a physical altercation. The officer spoke to the reporting party then located the suspects. The suspects were arrested and recommended charges were filed for battery, criminal trespass, and disorderly conduct.
- On 06/29/2024, we received a report of several businesses being either damaged or burglarized. This is still under investigation, however, a short synopsis is as follows. Maria's restaurant an unknown suspect broke the north entrance glass door. The suspect did steal a cash register and safe. The second incident occurred at Steak and Shake where the suspect broke the drive-through window, climbed in, and stole keys. The suspect also pried open cash registers but there was no money. The suspect also broke windows out of Subway and Amazing Hair and Nails. At this time the suspect is unknown, he did have a face mask on. We did get a video of the pickup but so far we have no leads after posting it on Facebook. We do not believe this person is local.

***During the burglaries the officers were sitting on a person at the hospital who was suicidal. One officer was able to respond to calls if needed, however, due to the suicidal person having a potential of violence the officers both stayed at the hospital, hence no one was actively patrolling. I will follow up with more information in the next report.

When meeting with the team I have asked they step up patrol in the business areas and check the actual doors, windows, etc.

- Chief did an audit of evidence and found many issues. The entire last month Chief has been working to correct these issues that stem back many years.
- The GPD put on a bicycle rodeo with a pretty good turnout. This was held at the College parking lot. We had many sponsors who donated things for the kiddos.
- Sergeant Luther was invited to talk with Curtis Duncan on the radio about her certification in child safety seats. Sergeant Luther is now certified in the installation of these seats and compliance issues.
- Sergeant Luther and Sergeant Porter completed their six-month intense leadership class. This was an in-depth leadership class Chief Erhart had them attend. I am very proud of them for completing this class.
- Officer Conde did graduate from the academy. However, he did not pass the final test. He will have to go back in six weeks to retake the test and will have to pass in order to be officially commissioned. This is a last-chance one-shot deal, if he does not pass it will cause separation in employment. Sergeant Porter is working with him to help him study while he continues his Field Training status.
- Officers are focusing on building checks and foot patrols.
- Chief Erhart did complete and submit the fiscal year training for all officers. All officers did get at least the required 40 hours of training for the training year.
- Chief Erhart completed the mandatory fiscal year reporting to the Attorney General's office in reference to Biased Based Policing. The GPD had no

complaints of biased-based policing in the last fiscal year. We also meet all the statutory requirements regarding biased-based policing.

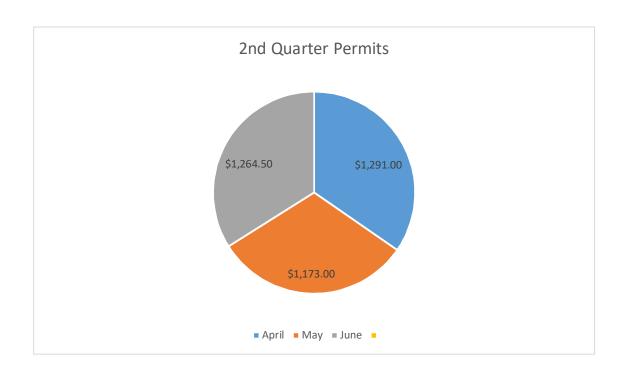
